An opportunity to ban nuclear weapons testing will come when the 118 countries that have signed the Partial Test Ban Treaty (PTBT) meet in New York City, January 7-18, 1991. The PTBT banned tests in the atmosphere, outer space and underwater.

At the conference, these nations will vote to amend the PTBT to put an end to <u>all</u> nuclear testing. Three nations have veto power: the US, Britain and the USSR, which has been willing to sign a comprehensive test han for some time. Currendy, the US and UK are opposed. To pass the amendment, a majority of the PTBT signers *must* vote in favor of it. And this majority *must* include the US, UK and USSR. If ratified, the amendment is binding on all 118 nations.

Please contact President Bush and your legislator and insist that the US support the Test Ban Amendment.

LAND MINES A Worldwide Public Health Menace

 $T\Lambda$ 7 or ldwide, land mines have become a weapon of **V** V choice. Governments and guerrilla armies alike are attracted to the use of land mines because they are inexpensive to buy, easy to obtain, simple to deploy and hard to detect¹. Costing on average \$3 to \$30, about 10 million land mines are produced each year by almost 100 companies and government agencies in at least 48 countries^{2,3}. Minefields placed in a couple of hours can take weeks to clear with average costs to clear one land mine ranging from \$300 to \$1,000 4,5.

The Public Health Working Group on Primary Prevention of War

The Public Health Working Group on the Primary Prevention of War was founded in 2011. It grew out of the American Public Health Association's (APHA) affiliated Peace Caucus and is now an international collaborative group of academics and practitioners representing over a dozen universities. The focus of this group is to call attention to, and take action on, a pressing public health problem that has received little attention in academic settings: the prevention of war, armed conflict, and militarism.

The APHA, in 2009, adopted a resolution naming war as a public health problem that should be better addressed in academic settings.(1) We subsequently studied this issue further and published two journal articles:

- Public Health Reports (2013), presenting our research documenting the limited number of courses on war in schools of public health.(2)
- American Journal of Public Health (2014), offering a framework of public health learning competencies for the prevention of war.(3)

VI. Summary

2	APHA has formally recognized, for at least four decades, the direct and indirect adverse public
3	health consequences of nuclear weapons research, development, testing, production, and use, and
4	has also explicitly recognized the essential role of public health professionals in advancing the
5	abolition of nuclear weapons. This policy statement provides an update to the evidence in
6	support of APHA's past policy statements and reaffirms APHA's call for the abolition of nuclear
7	weapons. This proposal calls for: 1) the United States (U.S.) and the other nuclear weapons states
8	to sign and ratify the 2017 United Nations (UN) Treaty on the Prohibition of Nuclear Weapons
9	to pursue negotiations in good faith on effective measures relating to the cessation of the nuclear

14	nuclear attack; 3) the U.S. Congress and President to address legacy and current occupational
15	and environmental health harms posed by the U.S. nuclear weapons complex; and 4) all public
16	health professionals and schools of public health to advocate for a world free of nuclear
17	weapons, including opposition to diverting resources to weapons development and production,
18	teaching material covering health impacts of the nuclear weapons cycle in schools of public
19	health, and conducting further research and publishing materials on nuclear weapons issues.
